
This will be my last 'Ramblings' column for the Cascade Blues Association as I chose not to run for President this year. I'm certain our members will give a warm welcome to our new board.



# Celebration of Life - Boyd Small

# Gone but not forgotten



) oyd Small peacefully passed away in his sleep on August 2, 2022. Boyd battled early-onset dementia for several years but remained happy and played music when he could. Eloise Donovon, loving soulmate says: "Boyd had a huge personality, a great sense of humor, a kind man with a beautiful soul. Even with dementia, Boyd always knew who his son Lucas, myself, and my Sister Georgia was. Boyd lives on in all our hearts forever, we miss him so much!"

Boyd's friends and family are surrounded by music, laughter, memories, and tears in Boyd's Celebration of Life on September 11, 2022. Lucas, Boyd's son, sang and played guitar. (His son Lucas was born in





Amsterdam to him and Anita Donk). Terry Currier says: "Seeing Lucas play was a highlight, he did not fall far from the tree as his exceptional vocal ability was in a similar vein to his father's." Lucas has Boyd's handsome good looks! Other musicians who played that day included Andy Strange, Henry Cooper, Randy Haines, Julie Strange, and others. "Boyd was smiling down on us." Says Eloise. Leon Knapp, a longtime friend, wrote Boyd's Eulogy and Eloise shared her heartfelt poem, holding back the tears as she struggled through each word.


Boyd Small, an accomplished musician, won five out of six Muddy Awards for Best Drums. a 1995 Cascade Blues Association Hall of Fame Inductee for Best Drums. recorded three critically acclaimed albums, including two with the 9-piece Boyd Small Band entitled This Time No Lies, So Easy, Diamond Boy and he recorded one with his 4-piece band titled Boyd Small Four + One. In 2005, a collaboration with Monti Amundson brought the release of Something Happened To Our Love, a new collaboration by Boyd Small and Monti Amundson for Rounder Europe. Small

Story and photos by Kathy Rankin also co-founded Cool Buzz, alternative roots and

Buzz, alternative roots and Modern blues label. He co-produced albums for both Dutch and American Artists, such as Monti Amundson, Jim Wallace, Drippin' Honey, and the Cuban heels. Later, Boyd became the band leader in his new venture, The Boyd Small Big Band. Small toured with Monti Amundson in 1997 and moved to Amsterdam to join the Benelux blues scene. From 2007 to 2013, Boyd established himself as a singer, drummer, and producer with his Dutch band. In 2014, Boyd Small went back out on tour and released More Love And Trouble featuring USA artists and International artists Monti Amundson, Josh Fulero, Roelof Meijering, Arthur Ebeling, Kai Straus, and Marc T.

Terry Currier of Music Millennium recalls how he met Boyd Small. "When Henry, from Eugene, moved to Portland, he played guitar in the Explorers. Henry introduced me to Boyd Small. Boyd Small really liked Henry's guitar work and after the Explorers broke up, Henry and Boyd went on to form the Falcons." When Boyd moved to Portland to join Henry along with another Eugene transplant, Andy


Strange. They became the Terraplanes. The Terraplane's included Eugene guitarist Jimmy Cochran (later replaced by Rockin' Razorbacks guitarist Chris Miller). The Terraplane's were a weekly band at the Belmont Inn and The Terraplanes stayed together for 11 years." When Chris left for Texas to play and record with other artists, Cory Wheeler replaced him."

Henry Cooper spoke fondly about Boyd Small. "At 22, Boyd was already


a talented and educated musician. He studied percussion with the legendary Charles Dowd at the University of Oregon. Boyd also played country music on the weekends. Boyd was particularly fond of an old Johnny Guitar Watson and Larry Williams LP I had, we wore that record out. We formed a band called The Milkmen including Randy Haines on guitar, and vocals and Carl Lohse (then later Michael Miller) on bass, myself on guitar, and harp vocals, and Boyd on drums, and vocals. The Milkmen were a good-time



party/dance band, always working. Boyd, a great lead singer, harmonizes so well, he earned the nickname "Harmony Man." Later, they formed the Los Falcons. Henry recalls: "It was New Years' Eve 1986, The Los Falcons were hired to play at The Pine Street Theater in Portland.



Michael Quinn of Monqui Productions needed a backup band for Screamin' Jay Hawkins, The Lost Falcons with Boyd Small, Andy Strange, John Barley, and myself. I am very thankful he thought of us! After that amazing night, The Los



Falcons were Jay Hawkins' backing band for many great adventures. Backing up Hawkins, The Los Falcons played the legendary Palomino Club and The Whiskey, as well as touring Europe playing throughout Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Switzerland, The Netherlands, and Finland. I could write a book about it. That was the beginning of Boyd's fame in Europe which lasts until this day.

# **LIL' RED & THE ROOSTER** – Blue Heart Records

ny of you hip cats and kittens feeling saxy tonight? If you're a sucker for a honking great big baritone, you're going to love the vibe of this album. Everything about it screams effortless cool, especially the appealing retro artwork. Lil' Red and the Rooster are Jennifer Milligan and Pascal Fouquet, a guitar-slinging blues duo who base themselves in France and the USA. Keep On! is their sophomore album, and their impressive bio includes earning a place in the finals at the 2019 International Blues Challenge.

Milligan and Fouquet work together like a songwriting tsunami on this project which features ten originals and one cover.

Several of their compositions - 'Back of the Bus', 'Bootstraps Break', and 'Little Girl' - feature a timely message about equality and social justice. Jean-Marc Labbé on baritone sax is an oh-so-tasteful addition to the duo, alongside rhythm section Felton Crews on bass and Kenny "Beedy Eyes" Smith on drums. Lil' Red & The Rooster are the kind of band that wears sunglasses with their pajamas and makes you wish you could too. Focus your audio, daddy-o, because these folks know their groceries.





# **Better Days**

**Cliff Stevens** – Self Release

Ome guitarists get la-Deled as a clone of Stevie Ray Vaughan. Honestly, I'm still wondering why that's a bad thing if you're able to channel a Texas guitar god whose virtuosity has become an enduring part of the blues lexicon. SRV was one of my early inspirations, and serendipitously the love of his life Janna became my yoga teacher for several years. But I digress – Stevens is no clone. He has a sound all his own, and it's worth listening to this album for the superb guitar playing alone.

Hailing from Montreal, Stevens has performed at events such as Tremblant International Blues Festival and Montreal International Jazz Festival. He has undertaken numerous Canadian and European tours including opening for Wishbone Ash in Europe.

Stevens wrote all twelve tracks and also produced this self-release. He struts his way through a variety of feels, from Texas blues to funk to ballads. Wrapping up the album is the deeply Delta instrumental "Slim Picking". Pat Loiselle on harmonica adds that authentic bluesy touch to several of these tracks, along with backing band Serge Dionne on bass, Eric Sauvé on organ, Sam Harrisson on drums and Kim Feeney on backing vocals. Stevens is also a published author so check out his book "The Stroll", co-written with his brother, about life as a cab driver in Toronto.

# **African Sources of the Blues**

# The Origin of the Blues (part 2)

frican musical traditions are many and diverse. So, in addition to looking at African music generally to find the African roots of the blues, we need to look, too, at those areas from which most slaves came.

Most slaves in British North America came from coastal West Africa, west central Africa, and the sub-Saharan steppes and savannahs. The musical evidence indicates that the traditions of the savannah and coastal west Africa came to dominate the music of Africans in North America.

During the slave trade, music was integral to African life, including work, ritual, worship, the transmission of history, dance, and entertainment. African scales most often contained 5, 6, or 7 notes. Notes were more indeterminate than in western music: You could

go much higher or lower than the tonal center in African scales and still be on the note than you could in western music. Bending notes was common, too. And where western music insisted on pure musical textures, most African musics allowed rough textures, such as buzzes, growls, shrieks, and cries. Communal singing, using call and response patterns, was widespread, as was improvisation to extend and fill in performances and to decorate melodies. Ring dances, including juba dances and ring shouts, were also part of African musical life.

African music

emphasized rhythm and melody over harmony. Music in west Africa was polyrhythmic, with simultaneously-played rhythmic lines that crossed each other and evolved by shifting positions relative to each other. Rhythm and melody blended together: Melody instruments and voices were rhythmic and carried some of these polyphonic rhythms, and rhythm instruments were often tuned and carried melodic lines.

Savannah music used a great variety of stringed instruments, xylophones, reed instruments, horns, and flutes. Savannah string instruments could be played percussively and often used bent notes. Melisma, the use of multiple notes for one syllable of text, was common, as was the use of drone notes. One important savannah tonal system may have included a scale derived from dual tonal centers a fourth apart (upward). This scale may have been the basis for the blues scale used in African-American music.

When African and western musics collided, the shock wave was epochal. We're still riding it today. From that collision, the blues inherited polyrhythms, scales, note indeterminacy, note bending, melisma, rough textures, percussive strings, and improvisation from African sources.
